





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What is the Financial Reality?



- Normative Investment: College costs money for all students
- Worthwhile: College allows individuals with ID to earn more after graduation
- Over Time: Many families need more time to prepare financially

Is college worth it? People with IDD can be up to 4X more likely to be employed after completing a higher education program. (Avellone, Camden, Taylor, Wehman, 2021) College offers lifelong learning, community engagement, and a fulfilling future!

General Financial Information

- Tuition and fees
 - same cost/credit
 - fewer credits
- Program fee for inclusive services
 - vary by school
 - ranges from \$3,000-\$20,000
 per school year
- Room and board, if applicable
 - vary by school
 - o ranges from \$11,000-\$20,000 per school year

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
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Federal Financial Aid



- 3 kinds of federal financial aid available to students in IHE programs
 - Federal Pell Grants
 - Federal Supplemental Education
 Opportunity Grant
 - Federal Work Study Program
- Not eligible for federal loans due to certificate outcome




Federal Financial Aid Cont.



 Families must fill out Free Application for Federal Student Aid (<u>FAFSA</u>)


- Common misconceptions about FAFSA
 - "My family doesn't have need!"
 - o "It's not worth the effort!"
- Amounts can change each year and vary depending on many factors

Division of Vocational Rehabilitation (DVR)

- DVR can provide funding for CTPs:
 - Connect with DVR counselor
 - Identify Inclusive Higher Ed as necessary for career goal
 - Maintain satisfactory academic progress
- Individualized based on family need
- Connect with DVR at this link



Case Management Agencies (CMAs)

- Some offer "Self-Determination Funds," "Unmet Needs Funds," or other scholarship funds if requested
- Most common in CMAs with mill levy funding





Student/Family Contributions



- Work-study jobs

the future of every student who pursues College expenses include tuition, fees, books, equipment, and room and board, if a student chooses to live on campus. These all add up, and every student must determine where the

likely to use many of the same resources as other college students to pay for college. There are some resources specific to individuals with disabilities to consider as well. Students are using numerous approaches to pay for college, often braiding together several different funding sources to cover the costs.

funding for college will come from.

Here is some information about a variety of possible funding sources that students and their families can consider as they determine what will work for their specific situations:

FEDERAL FINANCIAL AID

for students with ID have been approved as to federal student aid for eligible students school diploma or are not working toward a degree. Students who meet the income eligibility requirements may be eligible for Pell Grants, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants, and Federal Work-Study. Students in non-degree CTP programs are not eligible for federally subsidized student loans. This Think College Federal Financial Aid Brief

To access federal student aid, students will be required to complete a Free Application for Federal Student Aid, or FAFSA. This is the same form that all college students use to determine eligibility for aid. Learn more on the

SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarships typically do not cover the full cost of attendance for any student, but they can be an important part of financing education. Think College publishes a <u>list of scholarships</u> (updated annually) that are possible resources for students with ID attending non-degree programs. Read this resource to learn about state level, program level, and disability-specific scholarships.

MEDICAID WAIVER FUNDS

An increasing number of states allow students with ID to use Medicaid Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) waivers to support participation in postsecondary education programs. Medicaid waivers have been used to fund a variety of supports and services for college students with ID, as well as tuition or fees in some cases. Think College has published a brief that describes how Medicaid waiver funds Students who are eligible for Medicaid waiver services can pursue this source of funding to see if Medicaid can help pay for college costs as well as related support services such as transportation, peer support, or independent living instruction while in college.




